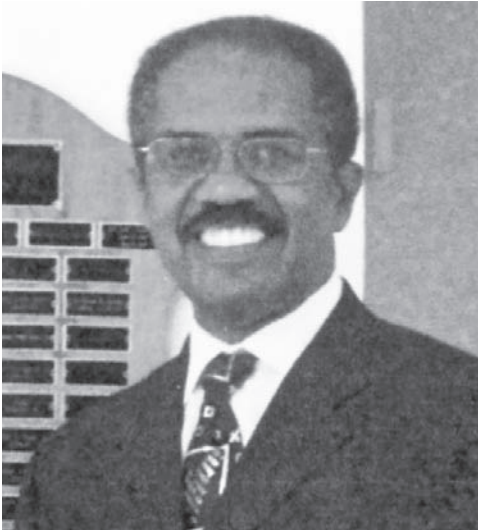

Three Winston-Salem ministers will conduct the 2011 Revival Services which begin at New Bethel on Tuesday, September 20. The services will be held three consecutive nights ending on Thursday, September 22. Rev. James R. Clyburn Sr., Pastor of Red Bank Baptist Church; Bishop John C. Parks, Pastor of New Hope Baptist Church; and Apostle Sylvester Davis Johnson, Senior Pastor of the Macedonia True Vine Pentecostal Holiness Church of God, Inc. Winston-Salem, North Carolina; all dynamic revivalists in the triad and around the state will bring messages from God. They will be accompanied by their choirs and congregations.

Reverend James R. Clyburn, Sr. is a native of Winston-Salem where he received his formal education. He attended Saint Augustine's College in Raleigh, North Carolina and earned the Bachelor of Science degree at Winston-Salem State University. He received the Masters degree from A&T State university. Rev. Clyburn currently teaches at West Forsyth High School. He has served in many capacities at Red Bank including Assistant Pastor. He became Pastor following the sudden death of his father, Rev. John J. Clyburn. The members of Red bank have been blessed for 26 years under his inspired and efficient leadership. He will lead the Tuesday night service.

Bishop John C. Parks, a native of Covington, Tennessee received the call to ministry at the age of 19 and has over 35 years of rich and successful pastoral work. He was Pastor of several churches all in Tennessee before uniting with New Hope. His education includes a Bachelor

### Make a Safety Plan

Two weeks ago, we experienced two exceptional fetes of nature—an earthquake and Hurricane Irene. If you don't have a plan for disasters, I suggest that you develop a plan to help ensure your family's safety.

A hurricane preparedness website suggests the following:

Step 1: **Build a "To Go Bag"**—An emergency kit should include some non-perishable food, water, a battery powered radio, flashlights and batteries. These items should be in a quantity to last at least three days.

Step 2: **Prepare your family**—Your family may not be together when a disaster strikes so it is important to know how you will contact one another. You may decide to purchase insurance to recover from some types of damages such as floods.

Step 3: **Be informed**—Hurricane hazards come in many forms—lightning, tornadoes, flooding, high winds, etc. and with each type prepare your family plan accordingly. Be prepared to evacuate!

These suggestions could lessen any inconveniences that bad weather could bring. 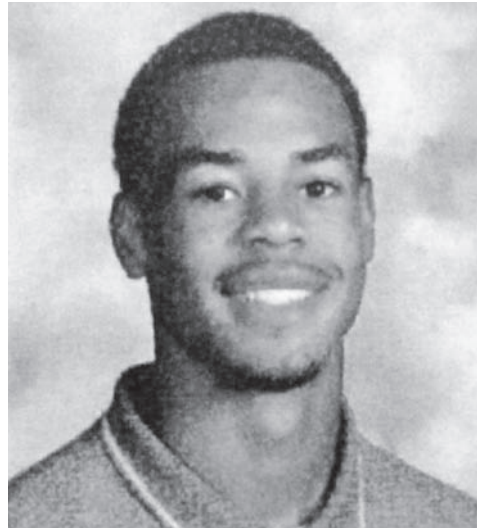

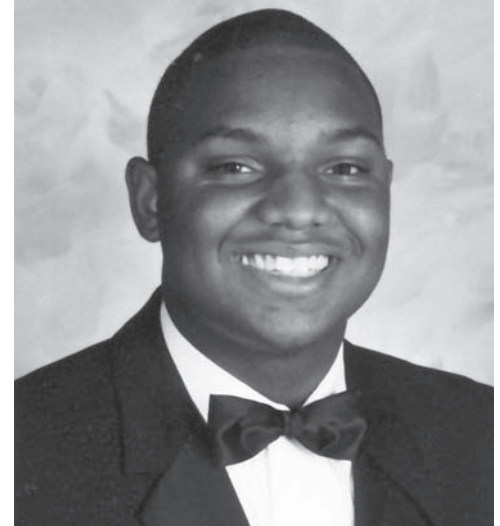
### Jonathan Booker Youth of the Month For August 2011

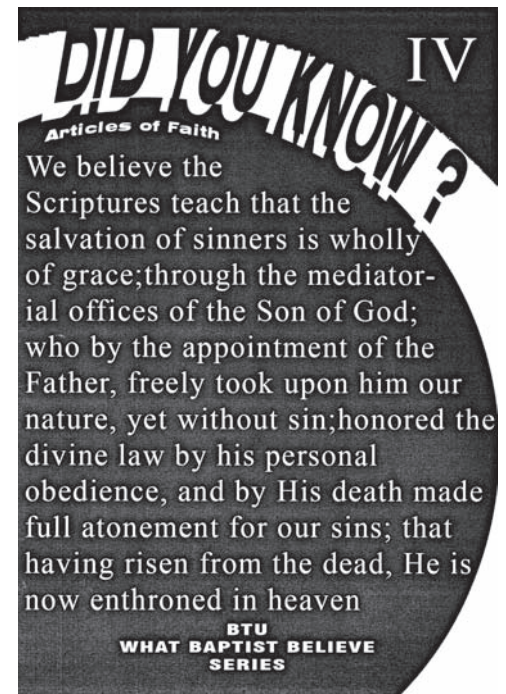
